The 1938 Presidential Issue - A Survey of Rates

Purpose and Scope of Exhibit:

This exhibit presents the 1938 Presidential Issue - 'The Prexies'- as a survey of the rates of postage and special service fees in effect while those stamps were current (1938-1961). The ever changing rate structure is what is being shown here. The impact of the changing military situation during World War II on international air mail rates is highlighted.

Importance:

This series of stamps was current for over 20 years, which spanned a world war. The rates changed over time; the air mail rates, both domestically and internationally, were simplified and reduced. The prexies were the work force of our postal system, in wartime and in peacetime, and they proved up to the task.



Half cent stamp used as change. Since double weight cover not fully prepaid, half cent stamps used as postage due. ONE half cent stamp given back as change, AND WAS AFFIXED BY PAPER CLIP TO ENVELOPE and stamp NOT CANCELLED.

With the October 1, 1946, rate change, the 5c air mail rate that applied to the 48 states would extend to ALL territories and possessions and would apply to a full ounce rather than the ½ ounce. This 5c rate would be in effect through December 31, 1948.

Prepaying 30c per ½ ounce air mail rate to Greece, July, 1941 use. Censored by the Germans and returned to sender due to suspension of service. Rate in effect April 28, 1939, through October 31, 1946.



Although normal air mail service to Switzerland was suspended from November, 1942, through June, 1945, express messages, from POW's, addressed to International Red Cross, were allowed to go through. This outer envelope was sent from Camp Swift, Texas, censored in New York by POW censors and entered the mail stream at the 30c per 1/2 ounce rate, which was in effect from April 28, 1939 through October 31, 1946.



Prepaying 30c per 1/2 ounce air mail postage. English naval lieutenant wrote home to his wife. Since writer used civilian mails, civilian rates in effect. Rate in effect April 28, 1939 through October 31, 1946.



Prepaid at 30c per 1/2 ounce air mail rate to France, cover returned to sender since addressee was a Jewish internee in Vichy French detention center. PSA marking indicated that addressee could not be found. In effect from April 28, 1939 through October 31, 1946.

P.O.W. letter sheet used by German prisoner of war to wife in Germany. Surface postage free, but since endorsed AIR MAIL, 30c air mail postage paid. Cover censored by US POW censor, as well as in Germany. Rate in effect through October 31, 1946.



Cover from Italian internee to family back in Italy, with the 30c air mail postage paid. Mailed from Internee camp in Missoula, Montana, but put in mail stream in New York, where it was censored by POW censor.

Cover signed by internee on front and back of cover. Rate in effect through October 31, 1946.



Prepaying triple 30c per ½ ounce air mail postage to Sweden. Magazine photos censored in New York by U.S. cable censors and in Great Britain by Ministry of Information. Rate in effect through October 31, 1946, when unified rate of 15c per ½ ounce went into effect.

Prepaying 20c per half ounce air mail postage from Hawaii to the U.S. mainland plus 30c postage to Scotland, plus 15c registry and 5c return receipt fee. Postmarked Honolulu December 12, 1941, the cover held by censors and arrived in California on Jan. 3, 1942. Note TransPacific & TransAtlantic Route handstamp which explains the 50c rate. 30c air mail rate in effect April 28, 1939, through October 31, 1946.



Prepaying 37 times the 15c per ½ ounce air mail rate to Switzerland. Rate in effect through 6/30/71. Scarce use of \$5 value on letter mail.



Prepaying first ½ ounce air mail rate to England from Hawaii, November, 1952 use. After October 1, 1946 domestic rate change, add on rate from the territories eliminated.

Prepaying 36c per ½ ounce air mail postage to Egypt, plus 15c registry. Rate in effect May 23, 1939, through August 5, 1940.



Prepaying double 36c per ½ ounce air mail postage to Palestine. Rate in effect May 23, 1939, through August 5, 1940, when mail had to be rerouted via transpacific route and rate increased.

After Italy entered the war in June, 1940, mail to eastern Mediterranean area such as Palestine and Turkey had to be routed via TransPacific air mail routes, whose rates also applied. This cover likely traveled via reverse horseshoe route, as cover was censored in South Africa. Rate in effect from August 6, 1940 through October 31, 1946.



Prepaying 70c per ½ ounce air mail postage to Turkey, January, 1942 use. This cover went by reverse Horseshoe route, and was censored in Cairo. Eqvpt. Rate in effect August 6, 1940 through Oct. 31, 1946.



Prepaying four times 70c per ½ ounce air mail postage to Egypt, which went into effect August 6, 1940. Originally dispatched on FAM14 via San Francisco, this was on the flight that was diverted to Hilo due to Pearl Harbor attack, and was censored in Hawaii. Cover rerouted and arrived on 3/22/42! Rate in effect August 6, 1940, through October31, 1946.



This lower cover was mailed Dec. 6, 1941, the first designated day of service of FAM 22. With NO evidence of Hawaiian censorship, it arrived in Egypt on February 28, 1942, almost a month before the earlier cover.

Prepaying 5c per ounce surface rate postage to Cape Town, South Africa plus air mail postage of 10c per ½ ounce from there to Tanganyika. This air mail rate in effect from July 18, 1941 through October 31, 1946.

Prepaying ½ ounce air mail cover by Australian sailor, addressed to his wife in Australia. Cover censored aboard ship, as well as entry to Australia. Since writer used civilian mails, civilian rates applied.



Prepaying 70c per ½ ounce air mail rate to Jewish internee in internment camp in Australia. Internee mail rate the same as regular civilian rate. Rate in effect May 23, 1939, through October 31, 1946.







Prepaying 15c registry fee on single rate air mail postage on cover to France, June, 1942, use. Cover held by censors until February, 1946. Released Handstamp. Rate in effect 12/1/25 through 1/31/45.



Prepaying 15c registry fee, in addition to 30c per ½ ounce air mail postage. Card held in Warsaw post office for duration of war (note Warsaw transit marking April 10, 1946) and returned to sender. Rate in effect December 1, 1925 through January 31, 1945.



The 11c value was the LAST value of the Fifth Bureau Issue to be replaced by a value of the Liberty Series. This 11c air mail post card rate went into effect July 2, 1961 and saw the end of the need to distribute this series of stamps.
