

Background

To celebrate the 50th Anniversary of the Disabled American Veterans organization formed in Cincinnati, Ohio, this se-tenant pair of 6¢ first class issues was released. First day ceremonies in Cincinnati and at the Maxwell Air Force Base in Montgomery, Alabama were held simultaneously on November 24, 1970.

Significance

We value our veterans and the contributions they have made to keep us free. The outpouring of interest for this issue resulted in over 1.3 million stamps sold on the first day. Cincinnati's event canceled 476,610 covers, and in Montgomery 336,417 were canceled. First Day Covers that memorialize those events are presented here.

G. K. Chesterton wrote these lines in his famous poem "Lepanto," which dealt with the great naval battle between the Turks and the combined Venetian-Papal fleet under Don John of Austria in 1571. The above quote refers specifically to the plight of the Christian captives in Turkish galleys, who, of course, were set free after the battle was over and the Turks were defeated. But from what we know of the plight of our own men in North

Vietnamese prison camps, the descripsituation today. tion is grimly and tragically true of their

Shakespeare, in his "Henry V," has King Henry order every man to kill his prisoners, during the battle of Agincourt in 1415. However, in the two speeches in the play immediately following Henry's order, we find two different opinions:

Fluellen. "Kill the boys and the luggage! 'tis expressly against the law of arms: 'tis as arrant a piece of knavery, mark you now, as can be offered; in your conscience, now, is

Gower: "Tis certain there's not a boy left alive; and the cowardly rascals that ran from the battle have done this slaughter: besides, they have burned and carried away all that was in the king's tent; wherefore the king, most worthily, hath caused every soldier to cut his prisoner's throat. O, 'tis a gallant

At times, killing prisoners was a mutual thing, as has been shown. After the fall of Acre, during the Third Crusade, in 1191 A.D., Richard the Lion-Hearted became angry over what he thought was Saladin's failure to return the True Cross and 3,000 Christian prisoners, in exchange for 3,000 Moslems. Richard ordered the Moslems killed; Saladin, on hearing the news, gave the same order for the Christian knights.

The chivalric code was not restricted to Europe. Around the 8th Century A.D., a recognized code of behavior for the

military grew up in Japan, known as "the way of the horse and the bow." It lasted

Two incidents in American history come to mind when both sides knew no prisoners would be taken.

The first was after the infamous Cherry Valley Massacre, of November 11, 1778, during the Revolutionary War. Described by historians as "monuments to the bloodthirsty Johnson family, the Butlers—John and Walter—and Chief Joseph Brant's Indians" the Tory/Indian atrocities in northern Pennsylvania and New York left the night hideous with flames of burning settlers' cabins, and the screams of the dying.

Action after the massacre was accompanied by great cruelty on both sides. There is one account of a frontiersman, having come upon a failen Indian, wounded after a skirmish. "I beg you," cried the Indian. "Give me quarter!" "I give you Cherry Valley quarter," growled the settler, and buried his tomahawk in the Indian's skull.

The second was at the defense of the Alamo, February/March 1836. Generations of American schoolchildren have known the story, and thrilled to it, how Colonel Travis answered Santa Ana's demands for surrender with a cannon shot.

Santa Ana's troops promptly raised the blood-red flag of "No Quarter" and to back it up, as the Mexican storming columns swept forward, the Mexican bands in the background were heard playing



6-CENT DISABLED AMERICAN VETERANS AND PRISONERS OF WAR

COMMEMORATIVE POSTAGE STAMPS





The 6-cent commemorative stamps honoring the 50th anniversary of the Disabled American Veterans organization and pointing attention to the plight of servicemen who are prisoners of war or reported missing in action in Southeast Asia, will be first placed on sale on November 24, at Montgomery, Alabama and Cincinnati, Ohio.

The stamps were designed by Stevan Dohanos of Westport, Connecticut, Chairman of the Citizens' Stamp Advisory Committee.

At the top of the DAV stamp, in white lettering on a blue panel is "50 Years of Service." In the center is the DAV emblem. Beneath, in white lettering on a red panel is "United States 64."

At the top of the POW stamp, in white lettering on a blue panel is "Honoring U. S. Servicemen." Center, in black is "Prisoners of War/Missing and Killed in Action." Bottom, in white lettering on a red panel is "United States 6¢."


The vertical stamps will be issued in sheets of 50 and will require two passes through offset presses to print yellow, blue, red and brown. Also an additional red and blue plus black will be applied by a pass through the Giori press. Each sheet will contain 25 stamps of each design, with the DAV the first stamp in each row, the POW the second, and alternating across the sheet in that order.

Distribution will be made as fast as manufacturing facilities permit, and it is anticipated that some offices will not receive their supply of stamps until after November 25.

Collectors desiring first day covers may send addressed envelopes, together with remittance to cover the cost of the stamps to be affixed, to the Postmaster, Montgomery, Alabama 36104, and to the Postmaster, Cincinnati, Ohio 45202. The covers will be serviced with a single stamp (6¢) or pairs showing both designs (12¢) at both first day post offices. Covers should be plainly endorsed in the upper right corner to show the number of stamps to be affixed. Postage stamps and personal checks will not be accepted in payment of the new stamps. The envelope to the Postmasters should be endorsed "First Day Covers DAV stamp or POW stamp or both." Orders should not request uncanceled stamps and must be postmarked no later than November 24, 1970.




Only post offices with sufficient volume to order at least one box of 125,000 stamps would have seen these labels "at the vault level" of their postal operations.




Note the plate block number is trimmed on the left, perforations, trim and image shifted right by 3 mm.

The perforations are correct to the margin and center DAV image.

This is indicating a color shift in the intaglio printing of the blue, red and black and not the offset printing of yellow, blue, red and brown.




Tribute to American Servicemen

any of America's 20.4 million wartime veterans have paid a high price for serving their country. Some were prisoners of war while others were left permanently disabled. Among their comrades are many who were reported missing in action or killed in battle.

In order to provide public awareness, American veterans have founded several organizations. The Disabled American Veterans (DAV) came into being in 1920, in the wake of World War I. Cincinnati judge Robert Marx was the founder of this organization which seeks to care for disabled combat veterans and help provide for their needs.

The DAV works with other veterans groups, including the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion. Government programs are coordinated by the Department of Veterans' Affairs, which became a Cabinet level office in 1989.



Mr. Zip began appearing on the selvage of US stamps with the **5c Sam Houston** issue of January, 1964, although often credited with the Mary Cassatt issue, issued in May of that year.

The design for Mr. Zip was created by Howard Wilcox, the son of a letter carrier.

Mr. Zip appeared in the selvage of US stamps until January of 1986.

Why Shifts Happened:

These stamps were printed with two passes through the offset (lithograph) press, applying first:

Yellow and Blue ink then Red and Brown ink

Red, Blue and Black ink were then applied by the Giori engraving press. These must both align. At the end of the Giori press, the perforating machine finished the process, with perforations line perf 11. These varieties show that Offset Press printing was used to register the perfs, regardless of where the Giori engraving press was aligned for other colors.

Note these stamps perforations are **well centered for the offset printing** shown in center circle of the design only. The engraved printing by the Giori press has the color shift.

Progressive Black Color Starvation

The complexity of printing this stamp comes from the number of colors and the number of passes through the presses.

1. Stamp Design and Introduction

Two passes through the offset press print yellow, blue, red and brown. A separate pass through the Giori press prints red, blue and black.





Generally the First Day Cover of a domestic first class rated stamp is either unaddressed or addressed for a domestic recipient. These two cachets indicate mail being sent around the world, and use blocks to pay the foreign letter rate.





Se-tenant pairs of the Disabled Veterans and Honoring Servicemen stamps provided 12¢ towards the rate for foreign post cards and letters, with stamps added to make up the prevailing rate.



Post card sent Airmail to Breda, Netherlands March 1, 1971. Correctly franked 13¢, paid with the setenant pair and the 1¢ Prominent American Jefferson issue, this rate increased to 15¢ on July 1, 1971.



Helmstadt, Germany February 3, 1971. Rate of 24¢ paid implying 25¢ international rate underpaid 1¢ with the se-tenant pair and two of the 6¢ Landing of the Pilgrims stamp, issued just a few days earlier on November 21, 1970. Lower Airmail rate to Europe of 20¢ established May 1, 1967.



Unsealed letter sent to Meckelfeld, Germany using 8¢ printed matter rate in effect July 1, 1971.



Letter sent to **Kathmandu**, Nepal using se-tenant pair and the 5¢ Shakespeare to pay the new reduced 17¢ Airmail rate in effective July 1, 1971.

Return for Postage



Letter sent Airmail to Victoria, Australia. Initial postage paid 26¢, overpaying the ½ oz rate of 25¢ by 1¢. Handstamped, "Return for Postage" indicating overweight and total postage due of 50¢, deficient 24¢. Airmail 25¢ Lincoln added to pay deficiency and letter sent to destination.

The Honoring Servicemen stamps were selected for the Plewacki Post Stamp Society's annual show, Alpex, in Buffalo, NY held on April 2nd, 1971 at the American Legion. These two color lithographed show covers ask patrons to "Remember of P.O.W.s."



Lower cover shows an additional print line of ink on the show cancel strike from top heavy pressure.

In March of 1971, shortly after the stamps issue date, these Naval commemorative covers were franked using the Disabled Veteran and Honoring US Servicemen issues, appropriate for their commemoration.






