PALESTINE EMERGENCY DELIVERIES INC

Lydda Airport was closed by the British on April 25, 1948 and handed over to the Arab Legion. All official airmail ended on May 1 when the U.S. announced it would not allow its' planes to land in belligerent territory. After the SS Kedma left Haifa on May 6th, Palestine mail was shut off from the rest of the world.

In response to these facts, the Jewish Agency in New York created the PALESTINE EMERGENCY DELIVERIES INC. This was the first time in U.S. Postal History that a specially created private organization was authorized to collect, cancel, and forward U.S. mail to a foreign country. Mail to Israel was franked 25 cents, the U.S. airmail rate, enclosed with a fee for handling in the larger envelope and was sent to the PEDI office. Most franking used postage stamps, but occasionally meters were used. The latter are very uncommon. The enclosed envelope was then removed and stamped with the following markings: a, for the First Flight a rubber one line stamp inscribed "First Flight to Israel". b, a dateless device with the word "CANCELLED" in serif letters surrounded by diagonal bars (type I). The highest number found so far is 211. c, While the first mark was being applied, a second device was obtained with a changeable dating portion and also applied (Type II). This was then used on all subsequent mail. d, all envelopes were stamped with a number, in sequence, the lowest recorded being "21". This work was supervised by Sarah Behrman, secretary in the office.

The first flight mail was date May 21, 1948, but actually left later. It was flown by a U.S. plane to Rome where it was transferred to a Czechoslovakian airline flight of June 2, 1948 that was routed through Athens for refueling and then on to Israel. Unable to land in Tel Aviv because of bombing, it went directly to Haifa. There, Mr Taussig, the CESKOSLOVENSKE AEROLINE representative, and his wife, spent the night applying the cachet in violet or black on arrival and then they transported this mail to Tel Aviv during the morning of June 3, 1948 where it was deposited in the Israeli postal system. This cachet was applied only on the first flight in which over 1100 pieces were carried.


The U.S. reestablished postal services on June 29 but PEDI continued until the end of July.

Rather than show examples of each flight, this collection exhibits varieties of the First Flight and subsequent ones in regard to markings, rate, and unusual transmission.




