Exhibit Format:

The exhibit is designed to take you through the continuing openings of the various Agencies by date. A boxed heading will indicate the opening date of that Agency. As each Agency changed cancels, they are highlighted to show the new usage.

Historical Background:

Morocco was serviced postaly by the Offices and Agencies of England, France, Spain and eventually Germany. This exhibit deals with those aspects of the German Agencies which were the last to officially open chronologically in 1899 and belonged to the UPU upon inception.

The Reich Post Office made this decision on the basis of German trade ranking second in the Moroccan economy and shipping first.

In 1904, 187 Germans lived in Morocco. The colony in Tanger had 71 people of which 24 of them were civil servants and their families, but only 17 merchants and their employees. 26 lived in Casablanca. 5 in Rabat, 3 in Mazagan, 4 in Saffi, 6 in Mogador, and only 1 in Marrakesch. These small numbers are reflected in the quantity of covers found related to the postal agencies in all of Morocco. Thus the greater balance of covers emanate from Tanger.

Independent Postal Agencies were opened and operated by German businessmen, usually agents for the Woermann Line, thus giving cause to be noted as Agencies rather than Post Offices. With the rapid increase in foreign trade, the postal network needed to expand to include additional Agencies throughout Morocco.

With the Treaty of Fez signed March 30, 1912 the Sultan of Morocco gave up the sovereignty of Morocco to the French in the south, and the Spanish in the North. This did not affect the German Agencies until the commencing of hostilities in WWI. All German Agencies in the French zone were closed in 1914. Spain being a neutral country, allowed them to continue to operate in the Spanish Zone. Following the war's end, the remaining 4 in the Spanish Zone were forced to close.

GERMAN SEA POST MAIL

The Woermann Steamship Line of Hamburg began regular service in spring 1890. The service called regularly at Tangier, Casablanca, Mazagan and Mogador. Unoverprinted stamps of the German Post Office were available from agents of the Woermann Line prior to the opening of the Morocco Agencies, thus there are no Vorläufer (forerunner) except Seepost (German). In addition there were no cancellers available, thus the procedure was to have the purser notate the time and place of mailing beside the stamps. Mail was then cancelled upon receipt and sent on by rail at a channel port in Germany and cancelled with the Hamburg-Dampfer cancel or when the ship docked at Hamburg, they were delivered to Post Office 1 and stamps were cancelled with a two line box cancel (AUS WESTAFRIKA).

AUS WESTAFRIKA



20 Pfg. 1st wgt step Sea mail posted on board the ship Emma Woermann and noted by the purser at Casablanca 6/3/90 with the additional handwritten "connaissement" by sender referring to the enclosed (bill of lading) posted by the commercial company H. Ficke & Co. founded by Herman Ficke the current German Vice Consul and simultaneous agent for the Woemann Line Casablanca. Received Hamburg 17/3/90. **Earliest known Aus Westafrika cover from Morocco.**

O.P.D.R SHIP CINTRA



The Oldenburg-Portugiesische Dampfschiffs-Rhederei (O.P.D.R.) was one of the most important and active German maritime companies sailing roundtrip Morocco to Germany beginning in 1895. The Cintra was one of the ships that formed part of this fleet.

Except for the Woermann company, which after 1894, were issued oval date stamps for use on board, all other steamship companies didn't apply cancellations per the postal procedure that applied to them at the time. Their mail was cancelled on arrival at Hamburg with hand-stamps AUS WESTAFRIKA or SCHIFFSBRIEF PAQUEBOT.

This cover from Morocco to Ulm Germany was transported by the ship Cintra, franked 20pf for first wgt. step, cancelled on arrival at Hamburg with the maritime cancel Schiffsbrief Paquetbot. Transit datestamp on reverse, Hamburg 18 January 1896 and arrival datestamp Ulm 19 January 1896. One of three covers known to date originating in Morocco with this maritime cancel and the only cover known carried via the Cintra.

PROFESSOR WOERMANN XIV



In October 1894, the mail steamers of the Woermann Line were given special Sea-Post cancels. The mailman was no longer required to post a M/S note of acceptance. This sea mail letter was sent via the Professor Woermann XIV without prepaid postage on the company envelope Casablanca to Hamburg. 25/12/94 with the "T" postage due notation 20 pfg being the rate, 40 pfg is written in blue M/S for the postage due to be collected. Three lined framed marking in violet to the left reads African steamship A.G./ Woermann-Line/Agency Casablanca.

HAMBURG WESTAFRIKA XV THEKLA BOHLEN

Letter posted on board the steamer Thekla Bohlen 7/11/95. M/S 14 gr. letter franked 20 pfg. posted from Mogador 7/11/95 to Stuttgart. Postmarked with the Deutsche Seepost Hamburg Westafrika XV cancel and received Stuttgart November 16.



STEAMER NAUTIK CHARTERED BY WOERMANN



Woermann had a shortage of ships available in late 1899 and chartered the steamer Nautik for this run which included three stops in Morocco including Casablanca on 23/12/98 and posted at sea with the Woermann XX ship cancel 1/1/99. Franked with 2 10 Pfg.to Hamburg and received Hamburg 8/1/99.

Only known cover from German PO Morocco carried by the steamer Nautik.



GERMAN POST OFFICE SEA MAIL

JEANETTE WOERMANN X

Feb. 1896 Mogador to Stuttgart franked 20 Pfg. Sent aboard the Jeanette Woermann X. and arrived Stuttgart 13/2/1896.

GIBRALTAR POSTAGE LULU BOHLEN V



Even though Reichpost stamps were available from the Woermann Line Shipping Agents Weiss and Maur in Mogador, this cover is franked 25 cent. Gibraltar issue available from the shipping agent or the British Post Office and cancelled with the Woermann Line sea-post cancel V identifying the ship as the Lulu Bohlen 1 and used 1897-98. The Gibraltar stamp was applied and properly used according to article 11 paragraph 3 of the UPU agreement "mail posted on board had to be franked with stamps of the country whose waters were being visited". 25 cent. foreign rate to Braunsweig B/S Braunsweig 29/9/98. Only known Gibraltar franked German posted sea mail.




SEA POST CANCEL XIV. S.S. LOTHAR BOHLEN II

The Deutsche Seepost cancels were labeled with capitalized letters which indicated the name of the ship the cancel was supplied to. The ship Lothar Bolen II was issued cancel XIV. in 1895, as shown on this 15/9/95 posting from Brandt and Toele in Casablanca to possibly a relative Elise Brandt in Verden Germany. Franked 20f German postage. As agencies of the Woermann Line. they sold unoverprinted stamps of the German Empire for posting on their ships.

HAMBURG-WESTAFRIKA CANCEL XV. THEKLA BOLEN

These cancels are known with and without stop after the numerals. It is assumed that those with stop were replacement cancels for lost or damaged postmarks and may appear on another ship at some other date before or after transfer to that ship. M/s 11g provided wgt for posting 1st wgt. step to Germany and franked 20f. Posted originally from Casablanca and marked 3/7/95 on board. Received Bremen 13/7/95.




LINIE HAMBURG-WESTAFRIKA S.S INGRABAN CHARTERED SHIP



The Linie Hamburg WestAfrika marking is one of more than 44 different markings which indicate the route covered and additionally an index marking, either in figures or letters, to denote the shipping clerk or ship on which the mail was carried. XXX. Indicates the S.S. Ingraban chartered by Woermann in 1902. The XXX. with the stop indicates it replaced a lost or damaged canceller. Because the letter was cancelled on board the ship does not indicate where the letter was posted from. Postmarked 16/.4 02 to Saffi. B/S Saffi 24 4. 02.

OST-AFRIKANISCHE HAUPTLINIE



From April 1, 1901 the ships of the East African main line (Ostafrikanische Hauptlinie) traveled not only back and forth between German and East Africa but also around Africa and back and forth to Hamburg. The purser was supplied with a canceller with the inscription Ostafrikanische Hauptlinie plus a small letter identificator from a to h or i to o. This canceller shows the use of the small letter L. issued to the steamer Kronprinz. Posted 10 1 11 from Tanger to Hamburg at 10cent. postcard rate,

IDENTIFICATOR "r" ADMIRAL II



From the beginning of 1902 ships of the Ostafrika Linie visited Moroccan ports. Newly aquired cancellers changed verbage to read Deutsche Seepost Ostafrika Linie starting with the letter q. 10 cent. postcard rate Tanger to Bamberg Bavaria. Posted 29 7 10 and cancelled with the identificator "r" ship Admiral II.

INDIFICATOR "b" GERTRUDE WOERMANN



Replacement cancellers for the old ones contained the new inscription and a smaller diameter. Letters used were b,p,q,r, and s. Letter "b" was assigned to the Reich mail ship Gertrude Woermann from 1907-1914. Posted Tanger 25 7 12 to Hamburg. Franked 10pf. with the available German postage stamp.



REICHSPOST STAMPS

As noted with the shipping lines, German Reichspost stamps were available to the Postal Agencies in 1899. Even though in use after the issuance of "Marocco" overprinted stamps in 1899, the loss on the exchange rate of the Moroccan Hasani peseta vs. the German pfenniq made it ill-advisable to use German stamps in mailing. 45 pfennig 2nd weight step Tanger to Gera in the Principality of Reuss Germany, Overland via Cadiz received Gera 19/2/00

REICHSPOST

The chief post office was in Tanger and its postal director had postal authority over all postal agencies in Morocco. The post office upon opening belonged to the UPU and the office in Tanger was directly under the authority of the Reich Post Officein Berlin.

From Tanger mail for Germany was transported overland via Cadiz and took 5 days generally. Cover posted 29/5/00 Tanger to Frankfurt paying 20f 1st step rate. Received Frankfurt 3/6/00.



TANGIER AGENCY OPENED 20/12/1899

The first stamps issued for Morocco were those of the German Empire issue of 1889 overprinted "Morocco" with the franking in centimos and pesetas the local currency. Rates in effect up to Oct. 1907 were as follows: foreign letter rate 1st step 25 cent. to 15 gr., local letter rate 10 cent. to 15 gr., registration 25 cent. Postcards were 5 cent. locally and 10 cent. foreign. Germany was considered foreign rate up to 1907.



Tangier to Johannesburg 4/1/00 5 centimos printed matter rate. Mail from Morocco would have normally been transported down the west coast to Cape Town, and from there by rail to the ZAR (Zuid Afrikaansche Republik). With the outbreak of the Anglo-Boer War on 11th October 1899, this route was cut, and the only route in was through Portuguese East Africa and the port of Lourenco Marques. The route from Tangier was through Marseille onto the French packet SAHAGLIEN with the "Ligne Marseille A La Reunion" transit applied the 10th of January and B/S arrival in Reunion the 17th of February. Forwarded to Lourenco Marques and placed on board the railway arriving at Johannesburg 6/3/00. Incoming mail from British Colonies was opened and censored at the border in Lydenburg, or upon arrival either in Johannesburg or Krugersdorp. Incoming mail from friendly countries generally was not opened, but okayed by a blue M/S checkmark as marked on the front above León or "doorgelaten" (passed). Currently the only known item from Morocco into the ZAR during the Boer War.



1ST WEIGHT STEP FOREIGN


Tanger 6/7.00 1st issue 25 cent. 1st weight step foreign rate to Warnemünde 11.7.00. Germany was considered foreign rate until 1907.





75 centimos second weight step registered 29/12.99 Tanger to Oldenburg . Registered commercial cover from Borgeud Reutmann & Co. imprinted on reverse flap compressed with company red wax seal. Received Oldenburg 3.1.00.

1ST ISSUE GERMAN EMPIRE ISSUE OF 1899 OVERPRINTED MAROCCO + VALUE ON STEEP 56° ANGLE



Tanger 5 centimos printed matter rate rate to Arnstadt franked with the German offices first issue overprinted Marocco + the value and in this case 5 centimos on 5 pfg with steep angle 56°. When the essays were produced, only Marocco appeared on the face at 45° angle. Because of unfavorable currency rates in the fiscal year 1897/1898 it became necessary to issue the stamps with local currency, necessitating the change of angle to accommodate the inclusion of the centimos value.



REGISTERED TO GERMANY

Posted 11/5.00 Tanger to Grevenbroich Germany. Franked 50 centimos for 25c 1st wgt step foreign rate and 25c registration. Received 16/5/00.

2ND WGT STEP REGISTERED TO FRANCE

Posted 10/8.01 Tanger to Marseille Le Canet Station france. Franked 76c 50c 2nd step plus 25c registration, overpaid by 1c. Received 14/8/01.



BORGEAUD, REUTEMANN & CO PRE-PRINTED ENVELOPES



Borgeaud Reutemann & Co. were merchants and shippers in Tanger. Through license with the German Post Office they were allowed to privately print envelopes for business use. This 10 centimos paid the local letter rate up to 15 gr. This return pre-addressed letter was returned and posted 3/5.01 in Tanger.

GERMANIA EMPIRE ISSUE OF 1900



20 October 1900 first day cover of Morocco's second issue with 5 cent. overprints on Germania Empire Issue of 1900. Mixed with first issue 10 centimos Crown and Eagle, 25 cent. the rate 1st weight step foreign. Mailed from Tanger to the Duchess Frau Herzogin Johann Albrecht at Herzogin von Mecklenburg received Schwerin 27.10.00 and redirected to Ludwigslust 27.10.00.

LOCAL RATE OVERLAND BY MESSENGER

LOCAL RATE 1ST WEIGHT STEP

Town cancels were initially single ring date stamps spelling Marocco with two "C"s and two fleurons with the town name and date in the German style.



Tanger 27/5.02 to Casablanca B/S 30/5.02. 10 cent. 1st wgt step local rate.





MAIL DELIVERY BY MESSENGER (REKKAS)

Overland by messenger (Rekkas in the native language) on foot was the domestic means of deliverance in Morocco. Not until 1913 was it possible to travel between Rabat and Casablanca on the new French military railway. It however remained travel by foot on most of the routes. Tanger 29/11/01 mourning cover to Casablanca.

For purposes of moving the mail domestically in Morocco couriers (Bote) were employed and the forms they used were labeled Botenpost. The above form shows the North-South route taken by the couriers and the return route in the next column. French and Spanish mail sometimes moved by the Bote as was the reciprocal case by the French Rekke (courier) or Spanish as well. The number of letters carried were indicated between the Agencies and a change of couriers took place at each Agency. From 1904 money was carried by the courier and recorded in Alfonsa Peseta or Hassani money as indicated in the bottom left Hassani Peseta 2500 and Alfonso Peseta 2000.

KAESTCHEN "SMALL CONTAINER OR PACKAGE RATE"



Tanger to Osnabrück Germany. Franked 2 Peseta 20 cent The 146 gram package was rated within the flat rate of 2 Pesetas to Germany up to 1000 grams and 20 cent. the insurance rate for 200 francs. Posted 5/6/1905 from the German Embassy as indicated by a complete Imperial German Embassy Seal fully intact with string on the back. M/S endorsement "Kaestchen" in pencil on the cover indicating small container or package rate.

SEPT. 30 AND OCT. 1 OVERPRINT CHANGE ON GERMAN EMPIRE ISSUE OF 1902 INSCRIBED "DEUTSCHES REICH" WITH GOTHIC OVERPRINT " MAROCCO " AND FRANKING IN BLACK.

DATELINE "a' TYPE CANCEL





A second postmark for Tanger with "a" in the dateline was introduced in September 1900 and continued in use until 20 May 1911. Posted 27.4.11 Tanger to Uelzen near Hannover. B/S 3.5.11 Uelzen receiver.

1ST WGT. STEP REGISTERED TO ZURICH


Posted 8.9.09 Tanger to Zurich Switzerland. 50 cent. 1st wgt. step foreign rate registered B/S 131X09 Zurich receiver.





Tanger 10 cent. 1st wgt step to Faire de Leipzig in Germany redirected to Bingen am Rhein on 5/10. 10 cent. new domestic rate to Germany.

Oct. 1, 1907 1st step foreign rate change to 25 cent. for first 20 gr. Prior to this it had been 15 gr. In addition on Jan. 15 mail bound for Germany from Morocco was no longer determined to be foreign and the domestic rate schedule of 10 cent. 1st. weight step letters and 5 cent. postcard was implemented. Tanger 26/4.09 to Wien 1st step foreign Registered.





NACHNAME TO SWITZERLAND FOREIGN RATE

Nachname (cod) as a service of the post office was implemented in April 1900. It was a means by which cod fees could be sent for payment of bills and merchandise. The currency paying for the cod was written on the face of the cover (4 francs 40 centimes) and required registration.

Foreign rate 25 cent. 20 gr. + 25 cent. registered. B/S 17 June 1907 St. Gallen. Cert. Pauligk

EINSCHREIBEN/ RUCKSCHEIN

Registered and requiring a return receipt. This form of letter service required the personal delivery of the letter with a return signed receipt.

NEW CANCELLERS

Because Tanger was by far the largest Agency in Morocco several additional cancellers were employed. Below are examples of those in use in Tanger. Friedemanns 34 cancel was the second type canceller used in Morocco and only in Tanger. It is referred to as a wheel canceller, with the date bridge supporting the month, year, and hour aligned across the middle of the canceller. It was first used beginning July 1905 and was retired May 20 1911. 5 cent. P/C rate to Altona (Elbe).









New type cancel with stops after dates.Tangier 13.4.09 with "b" below dateline. B/S Zutphen 17.4.09.

Tanger to Venlo Holland redirected to Zutphen to L.H. Eberson Ritmeester der Hussain (Captain in the Hussars.

DOMESTIC POSTCARD RATE



This seldom used canceller with "c" in subline below date was a spare one in use Dec. 1909 to 20 May 1911. 5 cent. domestic postcard rate Tanger 11.1.10 to Leipzig.

MAROKKO CANCEL CHANGE 21 MAY 1911



18.6.11 unsealed printed matter rate registered Tanger to Krombach 25.6.11. Late usage of the 30 cent./25pf overprint as overprint and cancel were changed 21 May 1911 to read "Marokko" with 2 "KK"s.



MOURNING COVER



15.2.12 mourning cover Tanger to Saarbrucken. 10 cent. domestic rate + 25 cent. registration. Stamps and cancels with the 1911 overprints and cancels "Marokko" double "k". B/S Saarbrucken 20.2.12.



Tanger 14.7.11 to Culmsee which at the time was in West Prussia. Today the city is known as Chemźa in Poland. Registered on an insured labeled envelope but crossed out with no values added. Unusual in respect to an obvious commercial envelope but overpaying at 6 peseta 25. Culmsee receiver 20.7.11.

KAISERLICH UND KÖNIGLICH (K.U.K)



Tanger 14.10.11 to Brünn Mähren from the Royal Hapsburg legation in Tanger. The circular handstamp in violet on the front is the German phrase Kaiserlich und Königlich typically abreviated K.U.K. and stands for "imperial and royal" which references the Court of the Hapsburgs. A letter from the royal legation to the prominent textile manufacturer Handels-und Gewerbekammer. 50 centimos 1st wgt. step foreign registered.

DECLARED VALUE LETTER (INSURED)




Valeur déclaré (declared value letter) from Tanger to Wilmersdorf Berlin. Insured for 325 francs, the rate was calculated as 90 centimos marked in red M/S for 47g third weight step. Posted at the German Tanger Post Office April 12, and reposted to the Spanish Post Tanger the same day postmarked Valores Declarados 12 Abril 1911. B/S Cadiz transit Valores Declarados 13 Abril 11 and Madrid 15 Abril 11.

The UPU Congress 1897 established in their set of rules for declared value letters "the envelope used had to be sealed by seals in fine sealing wax and applied in sufficient numbers to keep all folds of the envelope in position". This envelope is sealed on the reverse with 5 wax seals thus accounting for the additional weight taking it to the third weight step.

1906 INLAND TARIFF RATE REDUCTION



15 Nov. 1906 the inland tariff was introduced from Morocco to Germany thus reducing the printed matter rate from 5 to 3 centimos. 11.8.08 Tanger to Germany.

3 CENTIMOS NEWSPAPER RATE

3 centimos newspaper rate based on first 50 grams Tanger 28.6.11 to Konigsplatz. New cancel "KKO" with subletter "a" in effect 22/5/11 to 19/8/14.


BULLETIN D'EXPEDITION DE COLIS POSTAUX

A bulletin d'expedition is a parcel card and Parcel Post is a postal service mail that is too heavy for normal letter post. The bulletin is universal in nature and generally connected with railway network. Howrever in Morocco the railway lines were just beginning to form thereby the transit time is noted as 5 days.

1911 preprinted cover of the "Compagnie Marocaine" to it's agency in Fez sent from the German PO in Casablanca and stolen in a robbery on the way. On the reverse side (as shown), is the Manuscript annotation in French: "Stolen Post between C'Ca (Casablanca) and Rabat at the end of September, found on the road near Bouznika". The condition shows fire trace and the stamp fallen off and three sealing labels of the Imperial German PO in Fes, tied by three postmarks "Officiellment Ferme" (officially closed) in manuscript and a signature. Morocco's commerce freely engaged both the Spanish (Alfonso) peseta and the Moroccan (Hassani) peseta. The Spanish peseta was somewhat stable and could easily be exchanged with the pfennig but the Hassani fluctuated wildly. Thus, the currency had to be notated when processing money orders. A fee was charged according to the value sent and a stamp affixed showing the tariff paid. This money order paid 1000 Hassani pesetas the maximum amount allowed on a money order and franked 1 peseta 25 centimos. Purchased at Casablanca and sent 2/7 .14 to Tanger . B/S Tanger 3 . 7 . 14

Larache cancel "cco" the first of two cancels in use from Dec. 1899 to May 1911. Originally the cancel color was black but was changed to black violet in Feb. 1900 with both being shown used.



GERMAN POST OFFICE



With the Treaty of Fez signed March 30, 1912 the Sultan of Morocco gave up the sovereignty of Morocco to the French in the south, and the Spanish in the North. This did not affect the German Agencies until the commencing of hostilities in WWI. All German Agencies in the French zone were closed in 1914. Spain being neutral, allowed them to continue to operate in the Spanish Zone. Following the war's end, the remaining 4 in the Spanish Zone were forced to close. This map shows the division of colonized Morocco between Spain and France. The French Protectorate (green) controlled a larger portion of Morocco than the Spanish Protectorate (pink/red). The coastal city, Tangier (vellow), was an international zone while the rest of Morocco was taken over.

LARACHE WWI CENSORED COVER TO DENMARK



With the commencing of hostilities in WWI, all German P.O.'s were closed 4/8/14 with the exception of those in the Spanish Zone. Alkassar, Arcilla, Larache, and Tetuan remained open until 11/6/1919 when they were closed after the treaty of Versailles. 31/12/15 Larache to Denmark. B/S transit censor signed by the watch commander and resealed with censor tape Postampt Hamburg "1". Kjobenhavn receiver 9/2/16. There are only a few known foreign destination war covers from the German Post in the Spanish Zone.

NOUVELLE FAMILLE



One of 16 postcards from the Spanish Zone released from a German archival trove after the war.

- Posted Larache 9/7/17 to Skierniewice Poland (occupied by Germany at this time)
- Franking assumed to be 10 centimos foreign postcard rate except one stamp is missing removed by the censor to inspect for hidden messages on the reverse of the stamp
- Blue number "26" is the sign of French censorship applied en route by the French Mission in Portugal
- Violet round stamp "Auslandsstelle Emmerich III * 24" is the German censor stamp of Emmerich located 4km from the border of the Netherlands censoring all incoming mail from neutral countries overseas
- The notation "Nouvelle Famille" written at the bottom refers to a German-French agreement to allow postcards and letters from Germans living in freedom in Spain to pass through France if the communication contained "news about the family".
- On the reverse the oval purple stamp "22" is from the Portuguese censors at Lisbon



ALFONSO PESETA

The two money order forms exhibited here show the money order examples of disbursement in the two different values of pesetas and the changes in the Postanweisung forms. Because of the difference in exchange rates making the Alfonso peseta more lucrative to trade in, the value of the peseta had to be specified to insure non speculative transactions. Very few examples exist with pesetas exchanged in Alfonso currency. Larache 10/2/13 to Tanger disbursing 60.45 pesetas Alfonso franked 65 centimos.

HASSANI PESETA

12/2/14 money order charges were changed to reflect a new .2% rate replacing the old rate of .1%. The forms showed both the sending and receiving postmarks, and were the same forms as those used in Germany. Alkassar 19/7/14 to Tangier disbursing 500 pesetas Hassani franked 1 peseta. Date stamps show both sending and receiving postmarks.

MAZAGAN AGENCY OPENED 20/12/99



Mazagan 23/1/00 to Colditz. B/S Colditz 1/2/00. The stamps were issued concurrently with the opening of the 7 post offices and the local currency was overprinted with Marocco at a 56° angle (steep overprint). Franked 150 centimos (1 peseta 50) 6 times first rate step for 75-90 gr. Not until 1907 was there a reduction in incremental weight step charges. On reverse is a partial Mazagan Post Office vignette

2 PESETA 50 CENTIMOS DARK BLUE 1900 ISSUE VALUE LINE IN LOW POSITION



Mazagan 16/2/05 to Hanover. B/S Hanover 25/2/05. The 2 peseta 50 cent. on 2 mark dark blue is the 1900 issue with the value line in the low position 0.3 mm lower than normal. Because no value is indicated beyond normal registered postage, an assumption has to be made as to the high franking and the assumption would be an over franked letter yet highlighting the low value line variety.

MAILED BY PAQUET COMPAGNIE DE NAVIGATION STEAMSHIP ARMENIE



Business stationery from R. Grundler a merchant in Mazagam to a relative in Mogador. Mailed board the steamship Armenie per the manuscript note on the face of the cover. The Armenie owned by Compagnie de Navigation Paquet in Marseille began trading in Morocco in 1863 and renamed the company Compagnie de Navigation Arménienne et Marocaine in 1874. Regular routing brought it from Mazagan to Mogador. Franked 10 centimos 15g rate domestic. Posted 8/ 3 07 and received Mogador 10/ 3 07.



COD CASH ON DELIVERY (NACHNAME)

Nachnahme (COD) as a service of the post office was implemented in April 1900. It was the means by which money could be sent for payment of bills and merchandise. The currency paying for the COD was written on the face of the cover and required registration plus a 10 cent. COD fee. 50 cent Mazagan to Bozen Tirol 1/10/11. B/S Bozen receiver 9/10/11.



In addition postal patrons paid the Brudo post any additional rate from Mazagan to the final destination.

It entered the German Post 22/3/00 and paid an additional 10 cent. the local rate. Received Tanger 27/3/00. Certificate BPA





B/S Wenings 17/9/04. 25 cent. foreign rate + 25 cent. regis.

The second of three Fes-Mellah cancels was issued in May 1911 and was in use until 4 August 1914. Posted 20.8.11 to Born Leipzig Germany. Franked 35 centimos 1st step registered. B/S Born 29.8.11



MARRAKESCH-MELLA OPENED 10/11/08





The Marrakesch-Mellah, a sub agency opened in the Jewish quarter in 1908. The cancel issued was with the normal "CC" of Morocco and a letter "a" to distinguish it from Marrakesch Medina. Franked 50c 2nd step registered to Charlottenburg Berlin Germany. B/S receiver 16/10/10.



In 1911, the cancel was reissued with the double "KK". Franked 10c paying 1st step as indicated by M/S 14.9 grams weight to Rosslau Germany. As noted, mail to Germany was considered local rate after 1907.





FES-MELLAH

Offices opened in the Jewish Quarters were known as Mellahs versus the Arab quarters known as the Medina. The Fes-Mellah office has one of the two cancels with the hardest degree of difficulty to obtain. It is Fes-Mellah "a" in use July 1911 to August 1914.



SECOND MOROCCO CRISIS



The Agadir Crisis, also called the Second Moroccan Crisis, or the Panthersprung, was the international tension sparked by the deployment of the German gunboat SMS Panther N°47 to the Moroccan port of Agadir on July 1 1911. In 1911 a rebellion broke out against the Sultan Abdelhafid. The French dispatched troops at the end of April 1911. On June 5, the Spanish occupied Larache and El-Ksar-El-Kebir. On July 1 when the Panther arrived at the port of Agadir, there was an immediate reaction from the French and British. They believed the Germans meant to turn Agadir into a naval base on the Atlantic. On July 7, the German ambassador in Paris informed the French government that Germany had no territorial aspirations in Morocco and would negotiate for a French protectorate on the basis of compensation for Germany in the French Congo region and the safeguarding of her economic interests in Morocco. Franco-German negotiations initiated on July 9 led to the Treaty of Fez on November 4. Germany accepted France's position in Morocco in return for territory in the French Equitorial African colony of Middle Congo. The letter was written July 19 from Agadir to a druggist in Danzig-Langfuhr and cancelled Marine Schiffspost July 23. In addition, the straight line cachet Marinesachet was applied to indicate Official Navel Mail. This is the only registered document from the gun boat "Panther" from this crisis.

B/S Trieste 28/10/00. 20 pfennig paid 20 g 1900 foreign rate. As is typical of Marine Schiffspost letters the cancels are more often than not smeared.



5 pfennig postcard rate cancelled MSP 19 (SMS Stosch) from Tanger to Lindau/Bayern. Received 29/9/03. The Stosch was deployed 4 times to Moroccan waters. The card was written 14/9/03 the last day of the second deployment, but not postmarked until en route 21/9/03.


DEUTSCHE MARINE-SCHIFFSPOST

"Nur für Marine-Schiffsposten" (Only for Naval Ship Post). The overprinted issue of the 10 Pfg was sold to sailors aboard German Naval ships from 1897-1899 for 5 Pfg with the German Navy subsidizing the remaining 5 Pfg. Postmarked MSP 33 indicating the HMS Oldenburg docked at Tanger between May 25-July 4, 1898. Postmarked 2/7/98 Tanger to Muennerstalt and received 7-8.
